

Just before the T junction at point 3, there is a small rookery on the right.

The wood on either side at point 6 is carpeted with wood anemones in early spring. Great spotted woodpecker, warblers and tits can all be found here, in spring and summer especially. Look out for long tailed tits in the trees and marsh marigolds in the boggy ground near the bridge at point 7.

Kingfishers have been seen on the stream at point 9.

Lapwing may breed in the large, open, agricultural fields around point 11, and yellowhammers are fairly common. In cold periods of winter the fields can provide feeding grounds for flocks of lapwings and sometimes golden plover, or flocks of thrushes or skylarks.

Keep a look out for buzzards throughout this walk.

Plumpton parish includes the villages of Plumpton and Plumpton Green. The parish lies at the foot of the South Downs, near Brighton and Lewes, in East Sussex. The southern part of the parish is within the South Downs National Park.

Public transport

Plumpton is served by two bus services (166 and 824, Monday to Saturday) and a frequent train service (London Victoria to Eastbourne, Hastings and Ore, daily including Sundays). There is also a daily train service from Brighton via Lewes.

Pubs and shop

Plumpton has four pubs: the Half Moon at the south end of the village, beneath the Downs; the Winning Post and Fountain Inn, both in the centre of the village, and the Plough, at the north end of the village. There is also a pub, the Jolly Sportsman, in East Chiltington. The Plumpton village shop is open daily and has a delicatessen.



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Follow the metalled footpath with the

gravelled car park on your

right, around the back

of the grandstand and racecourse

buildings, heading due south towards the Downs until

you come to a T junction at the

main entrance to

Turn left, following the racecourse access

your right.

road, and continue to its end, with the racecourse on your left and the Downs on

the racecourse.

Leave the George V Playing Fields and turn right along Station Road and then left into East View Fields.



Walk up East View Fields on the left hand side and turn left along the twitten between houses number 14 and 16, crossing the footbridge over the railway, heading towards the

grandstand of Plumpton Racecourse ahead.

Cross Plumpton Lane into the unmade road opposite. The house to your left used to be the Green Cross Inn and is believed to have had smuggling connections.

Pass through some large iron gates and follow the tree-lined track known as the Ferrings, ignoring another track to the left leading to Chiltington Ferrings. This is an old Roman Road called the Greensand Way.

Cross the bridge and continue along the track as it goes uphill between high banks, emerging at East Chiltington Church. Note the ancient yew in the churchyard and the eastern wall, which is built of Sussex marble, known as Winklestone.



Follow the metalled road sharp left down the hill, passing the Jolly Sportsman pub on your right. Continue on to the T junction, just past Hollycroft.

Turn left onto Novington Lane and walk north, under the railway, over the river and up the short, but steep Pinchers Hill.



Continue on, ignoring a lane on the right signposted to Cooksbridge and Lewes, but note the old letterbox at the junction. Take the next turning to the left onto a farm access road and bridleway.

Continue on to the end of the road, passing through North Barnes Farm, to return to Station Road by the Winning Post pub.



Turn left to return to the George V Playing Fields.
